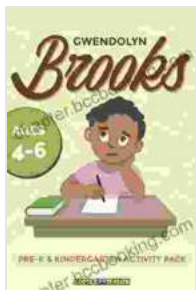


Engaging Black History Lesson Plan For Kids Featuring Pulitzer Prize Winning Authors And Illustrators

Many museums and historical sites have exhibits on Black history. Take your kids to visit one of these places and learn more about the history of Black people in America.

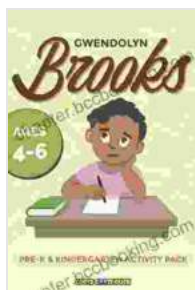
5. Invite a guest speaker to talk to your kids about Black history.
