Details in the Dialogue

Facts: Study your dialogue and the dialogue of the other characters for what facts are known and unchangeable about your characters: sex, gender, race, family members, religion, job, education or opinions are our facts. If the playwright places a fact about your character in the play, that means it's important, as there and it should be important to you.

Concrete Assumptions: These are the pieces of information you can assume about your character based on the situation that we see or hear in some situation, opinion, the way your character talks, the way other characters talk about your character, or something that changes based on the introduction of a fact.

Most Important: Note that you have the details determine what's the most important piece of information about your character. What's the one detail? How do you play that detail physically and emotionally? Specific physical and emotional action is what will make your character three-dimensional.

Structure

Main action items in a number of their dialogue. All the things that get into a scene and then from the context. Content is

king, right? What a character says is most important, but how they say it, right?

Getting wrong, wrong! The structure of a line of dialogue is a happy line of communication between the playwright and the actor. You can learn so much about your character by how they speak, not just what, or whether they do. Do they use contractions or a heavy word and so on? Is there a tilt? Is the character's vocabulary peppered with 10 letter words? Do they understand time words? How is the character's background reflected in the way they talk? Go through your script and define the structure of your character's dialogue. What does this structure say about your character's personality?

The most important aspect of studying your character's structure is looking about of change. What does the structure structure change the way character? Does the character move from run on sentences to still sentences speaking one word sentences? Does the character move from the past or the present more of a narrative mood? Does the character begin with the character hiding a secret? Go through your script and be on the lookout for changes in your character's sentence structure.

Stage Directions

It's been said a million times by directors: ignore the stage directions! And there's a good reason you want to focus on the text to build your character. But what direction that should be taken with a grain of salt. Sometimes, especially with a director of non-traditional prose, the stage direction

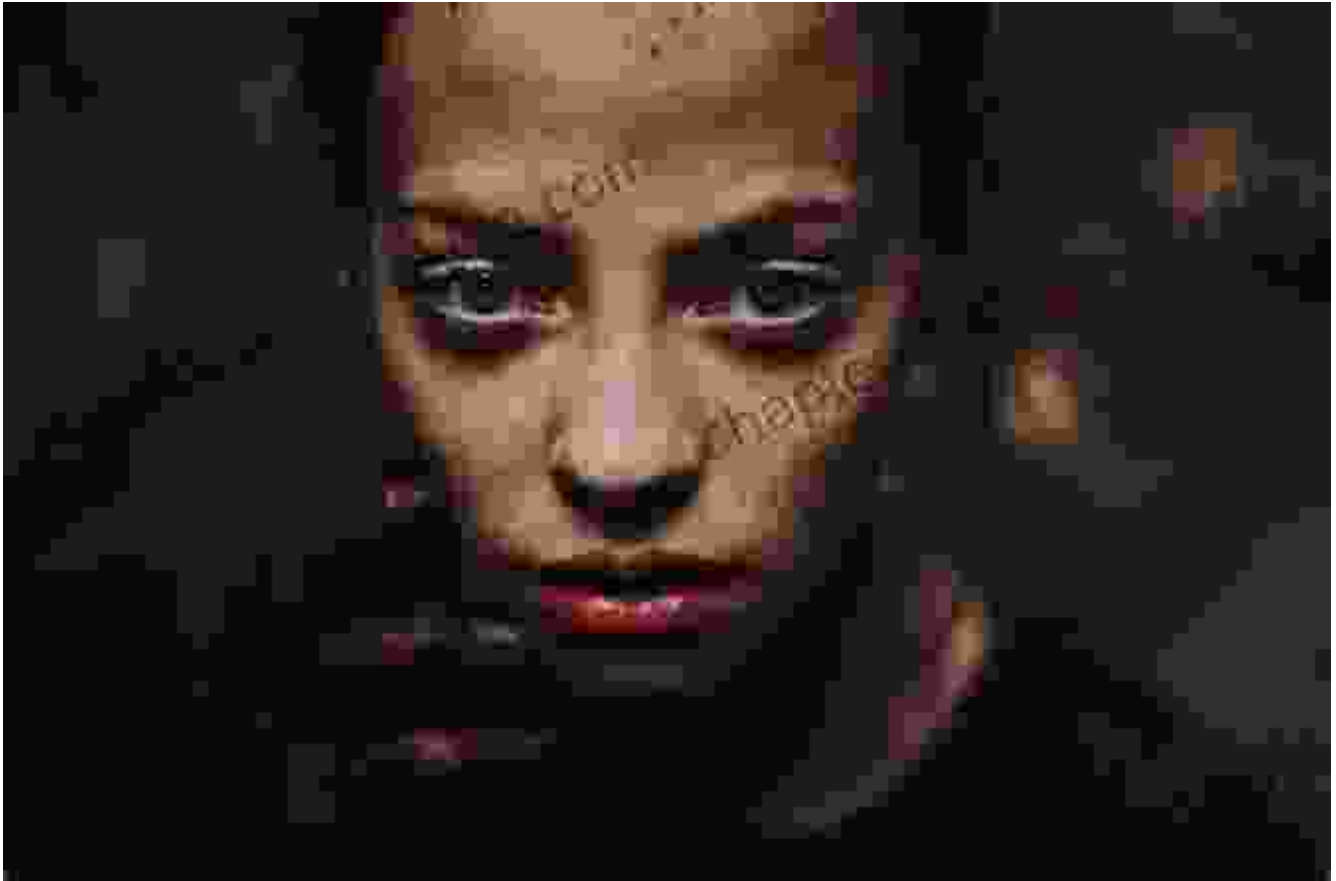
